# MCB 7922 FINAL ASSESSMENT - LITERATURE REVIEW (1 credit)

## **Course Description**

This course will help students prepare for the capstone project of the MS program, which is to generate a literature review in the field of Microbiology and Cell Science. Students must be in their final semester of coursework. This course will enable students to present, discuss, and synthesize recent original articles in the microbiological literature with emphasis in the microbiome in health and disease.

# **Course Learning Objectives**

After successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1) enhance their understanding of the current state of knowledge regarding the fields of microbiology and cell science
- 2) critically analyze primary literature and synthesize it and into a literature review that will be used as the student's programmatic final assessment.

This course requires extensive searches and reading of the primary literature on the topic you choose to write about in this capstone literature review. It is anticipated you will need to read and synthesize ~50 peer-reviewed, primary literature articles when researching your chosen topic.

For your research into your selected topic, use PUBMED (https://pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/). Do not use BLOGS or non-peer reviewed papers for final paper. Remember to connect to UF through VPN (if outside campus) before accessing the journals (https://connect.ufl.edu/it/wiki/pages/glvpn.aspx).

Week 8 - end: Revise the first draft and complete as many iterations as needed for passing of final draft of literature review before the final deadline.

However, Al should be used as a supplement to, <u>not a replacement for</u>, human critical thinking and analysis. *Make sure you always cite and acknowledge Al-generated content properly.* 

#### **Prohibited Use Cases:**

- Using AI to complete assignments or projects without human critical analysis.
- Relying solely on Al-generated content for research or analysis.
- Presenting Al-generated content as original work without proper citation.
