MCB7922 Journal Club Environmental Microbiology Fall, Spring, Summer – 1 credit

Course structure: This journal club is very informal. At the beginning of each week, we will select a scientific paper. Everybody will read the paper during the week and Fridays we will meet via zoom to critically discuss the paper, find strength and weaknesses, and see if and how it can advance our research. We will record the session and post it on Canvas for participants that could not join the discussion in person on Friday.

Journal Club Description:

Environmental microbiology has become a vast field that is driven by technological advances and the recognition of the vast microbial diversity that surrounds us. In this journal club each week we select and read a recent paper that constitutes an important contribution to understanding of microbial functions either through technical advancement or novel microorganisms, or innovative approach. As a group we discuss approach, results, and implications of the research, as well as its strength and weaknesses. The journal club should hone students' critical reading skills and broaden the exposure to state-of-the-art scientific research methods.

Prerequisites: Although we do not have any formal prerequisites, the Environmental Microbiology course MCB6656 is highly complementary and recommended.

Learning Objectives for Journal Club:

By the end of this course students should be able to:

1) Quickly identify the structure of a scientific paper and develop an in-depth

comprehension of primary scientific research methods and literature.

2) Quickly identify strength and weaknesses of research approaches and methods in environmental microbiology.

3) Verbally communicate scientific research questions, methods, results, and impacts.

Required Texts: No text is required for this course. All reading material will be derived from the primary literature.

Grading: The overall course is based on 100 points as described below.

Attendance and Make-Up Work: If you cannot participate in the paper discussion via zoom, you can participate by writing a 400-word summary of the paper and post it on Canvas in the group discussion of the week.
